

TRIO/SSS Tutor/Mentor Role

What are your job duties?

My job duties are to help students understand course materials and provide a clear explanation to the students to make sure that they aren't confused. Throughout the day, I will walk around the lab and check in students and make sure that they are doing okay. It also gives me a chance to see what they are working on and get an understanding of how I can help them. I also schedule one-on-one mentor meetings with students every two weeks and I help support the students throughout the semester. The mentor meetings help me to understand students and their needs, how they do their homework, how they study, etc. This allows me to gain a bond with them and also allows me to offer individualized support. There also some other duties as well, such as working on getting CLRA certified, complete trainings, and maintaining logs and staying caught up on filing, and answering simple questions. I also make sure that they are doing okay. It also gives me a chance to see what they are working on and get an understanding of how I can help them.



The way that I balance all these roles in my life is taking them one role at time. By that, I mean that I am a Tutor/Mentor while on the clock, I only do work that is TRIO related, so entering logs, filing, completing trainings. Once I get off, then I start to work on my homework, but I plan my week so that I don't overwhelm myself. When registration opens for my courses, I schedule a early session with my advisor and I choose classes that are online so that they are more flexible. My work schedule also revolves around my classes, so essentially I can make my schedule work for me. It's in the order that I want it to be in.

What are you going to school for, and do think your Tutor/Mentor skills would apply to your future career goals?

I am working on my Bachelor's Degree in Secondary Education. i am wanting to be a High School teacher and eventually become a college professor. I believe my learned skills would apply when I am teaching. I'll be able to break it down and take time making sure students understand their work. I plan on using my active listening skills and listening to my future students.

Out of all the workshops and social events which one(s) were most memorable and why? To me the most memorable workshop was the Crochet Workshop, it was memorable because all of my friends were there and we had a great time de-stressing, we didn't finish the crochet project but it was fun nonetheless.

"I think that the most rewarding part about being a Tutor/Mentor is being able to help others, another reason is towards the end of the semester, when the students will come and tell me about their final grade, and the look of happiness was always rewarding.

Bray Holyan, Summer '23 Lobo Academy Participant ran for Ceremonial Queen! Read about her journey:

What was your inspiration to run for Ceremonial Queen?

My grandmother was the inspiration as to why I wanted to give pageantry a shot. She was fresh out of high school and ran for Miss Navajo in '98. She was 18 years old when she ran and won the title of Miss Navajo. This led her to many opportunities on and off the reservation. Being her youngest granddaughter I wanted to give pageantry a try. So, I entered for the 101st Gallup Intertribal Ceremonial Queen Pageant at the age of 18 and fresh out of high school as well. Ever since I was a little girl I was always amazed and in awe of the Miss Navajo and the various queens on the reservation. Seeing them in their native regalia and representing the indigenous people as a goodwill ambassador was inspiring to me. I always love to try new things and challenge myself to grow and give myself new opportunities. To gain new knowledge from others and share my knowledge with others at the same time. Overall it allowed me to grow as a person in all aspects of life. There have been so many people who have helped shape me into who I am today and they play a huge part in why I had the intention of running. People such as my immediate and extended family members, school administrators, club coaches, and close friends have been there in support of me. Throughout the process of running I heavily thought about these people and made sure I gave it my best. For my ancestors and family members who have passed before me Throughout the process of running for Queen these people were kept in mind. It wasn't just for me, it was for everyone who helped me get to where I am today. Including family members and my ancestors who have passed before me. Their teachings still reside with me today and I wanted to shed light on that.

To the five other contestants who competed you each did an outstanding job and I commend you for your efforts in embracing who you are as a Diné and helping preserve our cultural teachings.

What degree did you choose for your degree program & the inspiration?

I chose Business Administration as my degree program because it is a good starting point for my career. My aspiration is to go into sports management. I also want to minor in journalism to help my career in sports management. I love being around sports and I love writing and this is the perfect opportunity to mesh the two together. My older sister Corey also majored in business administration and she has a great career in which she loves. As I am in my first semester this fall, I have a ways to go with my education but if I ever decide to take a different avenue. I would like to continue with political and Native American studies. To get more involved with my community and make a difference for my people.

Your sister Corey is a prior TRIO/SSS Tutor/Mentor, how has she inspired your education?

My sister Corey has inspired me in so many ways. I love her so much. She has been there for me in so many ways. She encourages me to try new things. And supports all my dreams. I have always looked up to her since I was a little girl. She did sports and was top of her class in high school. So I did the same and constantly worked at those two things. I continued to follow in her footsteps of going into Business Administration. She has shown to me how versatile this major is. She was the first in my immediate family to get her Bachelor's degree. Through her example I strive to get my degree as well and continue on to higher education.

They all spent early mornings and late nights helping me prepare, and contributing to outfits and props through the duration of my pageant. The most meaningful was her support and constant encouragement to do my best no matter the outcome. She helped me ground myself with the nature around us by accompanying me on runs to clear my mind. And this bonding time together really helped me spiritually and physically and mentally. To gather my thoughts and prayers for this competition.

Do you want to make a change in your community for the Navajo People? Do you have any advice you can share for those who want to do the same?

Yes, despite the outcome of me taking second runner up in the pageant, my work will not stop. My platform will continue to help preserve my language and culture. Help the youth to seek and strive for higher education and lifelong learning. Along with maintaining a healthy lifestyle. And finding one's true self and identity. There are many ways I plan on helping my community right now and in the near future. Advice I will share to help students is to be true to yourself. Don't be afraid of failure. Try your best and give it your all in everything you do. Love one another and cherish the five fingered people. Be proud of who you are as a Diné. Take pride in being Indigenous, you have a purpose here. Our Diné people endured so much in the past. Make them proud and be resilient, walk in beauty. Hool'áágóó T'áá Diné (Forever navajo) Sa'ah Naaghai Bik'eh Hozhoo (Live in Harmony)

Who would you like to thank? Who are you thankful for?





Also, a friendly reminder to our current participants, we are taking applications for Fall 2023. Feel free to refer your classmates, friends and family attending UNM-G to apply.


