

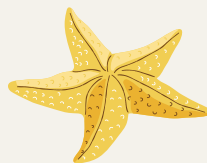

LOBO ACADEMY

Our Lobo Academy summer bridge program is currently in session. Lobo Academy offers free Math and English courses, a free four-year transfer trip, enrollment in a 3 credit First Year Experience course, staff and faculty mentoring, and many more opportunities to help in our student's college success. This program is aimed to benefit recent high school graduates, students that are coming back after a break in their education, and first year college students. By the end of this program, they should be prepared for college classes and have a better foundation for college success. We have each student take an Accuplacer at the beginning and end of the course to gauge their improvement.

Anyone who is a first-generation college student or meets our federal income guidelines is eligible for our TRIO/SSS program. "First generation" refers to a student whose parents have not received a bachelor's degree prior to that student's 18th birthday. All TRIO/SSS participants have access to our resources such as academic advisement, peer tutor/mentoring, our computer lab and printer, technology such as headphones and calculators, our textbook library, monthly workshops, and various others.

ONNSFA Scholarship

Office of Navajo Nation & Financial Assistance Scholarships is open for the Fall semester. The deadline to complete the application process is **June 25th 2023**. The required documents needed are Certificate of Indian Blood, Official Transcripts, Financial Need Analysis (Full-Time Only), 2 Letter of Admissions one from degree program and one from the graduate college, Graduation Checklist, and a class schedule. AIS Scholarship

American-Indian Services Scholarship is due by **July 3rd 2023**. This Scholarship is for the fall semester. Some of the requirements include a minimum GPA of 2.25 or higher, a completed FASFA for the 2023-2024 Aid year, a federally recognized American Indian or Alaska Native Tribe (CIB). Endowment Scholarship

The Endowment Scholarship is currently available for the Fall semester of 2023. The deadline to submit the required documents is **September 12 @ 5:00PM**. The application needs turned in the financial aid office. For this scholarship you need a typed essay, Letter of recommendation and Unofficial transcripts. Note that some scholarships have more requirements than others so be sure to review each scholarship if needed. "Juneteenth (short for "June Nineteenth") marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and ensure that all enslaved people be freed. The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States and is considered the longest-running African American holiday. On June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday. Juneteenth 2023 will occur on Monday, June 19."

PRIDE MONTH

Pride Month is an annual observance dedicated to celebrating the LGBTQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and other sexual orientations and gender identities) community, their history, and their ongoing struggle for equal rights. It takes place in the month of June in many countries around the world. Pride Month is an important time for LGBTQ+ individuals and their allies to come together, raise awareness, promote inclusivity, and advocate for LGBTQ+ rights.

The origins of pride month may be traced back to the Stonewall riots. LGBTQ+ individuals at the time were often subject to discrimination, harassment, and violence because of their identities. The tension came to a head on June 28th when police raided the Stonewall Inn. Patrons fought back which sparked protest during the following week. By the end of the Stonewall riot, the gay rights movement became known worldwide.
