SCHOLARSHIPS



AISES Scholarships

AISES supports Indigenous students pursuing STEM degrees by offering scholarships funded through generous donors and partners. These awards empower students through educational opportunity and help strengthen Indigenous representation in STEM fields.

Deadline: April 30, 2026



Indian Health Services (IHS) Scholarship Program

IHS Scholarship Program funding plays a vital role in reducing the financial burden of health professions educational costs for tribal members, while increasing the number of Native health care professionals. These scholarships are essential to expanding access to care and addressing clinical shortages within our communities.

Deadline: February 28, 2026



Cobell Undergraduate, Graduate, and Professional Scholarships

The Cobell Undergraduate Scholarship supports enrolled members of federally recognized Tribes and Alaska Native Corporations pursuing associate or bachelor's degrees at nonprofit institutions. This award is designed for high-achieving, community-involved Native students and offers meaningful financial support to help scholars succeed in higher education.

Deadline: March 31, 2026



Catching the Dream Scholarship

Catching the Dream offers three scholarship programs supporting Native students in STEM, business, and education. Awards range from \$500-\$5,000, with a 95% award rate and a 100% employment rate among graduates, most of whom work in Tribal communities.

Black History Month



Harriet Tubman

Black History Month is a time to honor the achievements, resilience, and contributions of African Americans throughout history. This occasion encourages us to reflect on the struggles and victories of individuals who have shaped our nation and continue to inspire future generations.

From trailblazers like Harriet Tubman, who courageously risked her life to lead others to freedom, to key figures in science, arts, and politics, Black History Month showcases the rich cultural heritage and enduring spirit of a community that has profoundly influenced the world we live in today. This month promotes learning and appreciation, fostering understanding and unity among diverse communities.

Harriet Tubman, born into slavery in 1822, escaped to Philadelphia, where she embraced her newfound freedom. She dedicated her life to the abolition of slavery, guiding approximately 70 enslaved African Americans to freedom through the Underground Railroad, which earned her the nickname "Moses."

During the Civil War, Tubman also served as a spy and nurse, demonstrating her unwavering commitment to justice and equality. Her legacy continues to inspire generations to champion freedom and human rights, illustrating how individual resilience can change the course of history.

As we celebrate Black History Month, we honor Tubman and others whose bravery has advanced progress and equality, reminding us that unity and courage can overcome adversity.

- A lesser-known fact about Tubman is that she worked as a professional cook to fund her efforts toward freedom. Growing up as the daughter of a cook, Tubman developed the skills that enabled her to feed countless individuals on the Underground Railroad.

Ingredients

- ☐ 1 cup all-purpose flour, not self rising flour
- ☐ 1 cup yellow cornmeal, fine ground, not cornmeal mix
- ☐ 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- ☐ 1 teaspoon salt
- ☐ 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, see notes for recent changes
- ☐ 1/3 cup neutral oil or melted butter
- ☐ 1 large egg
- ☐ 1 cup milk, or milk substitute like almond milk



Corn Bread Recipe

Directions

- Grease a 9-inch round cake pan or square baking dish or cast iron skillet well and set aside. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. See notes for other pan sizes.
- In a medium mixing bowl, add the flour, cornmeal, sugar, salt, and baking powder. Whisk to combine well.
- Make a well in the center of your dry ingredients and add your oil or butter, milk, and egg. Stir just until the mixture comes together and there are only a few lumps remaining.
- Pour the batter into the prepared pan and bake for 25 minutes until the top is golden brown and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.
- Serve hot.

UNM-Gallup Parking Pass



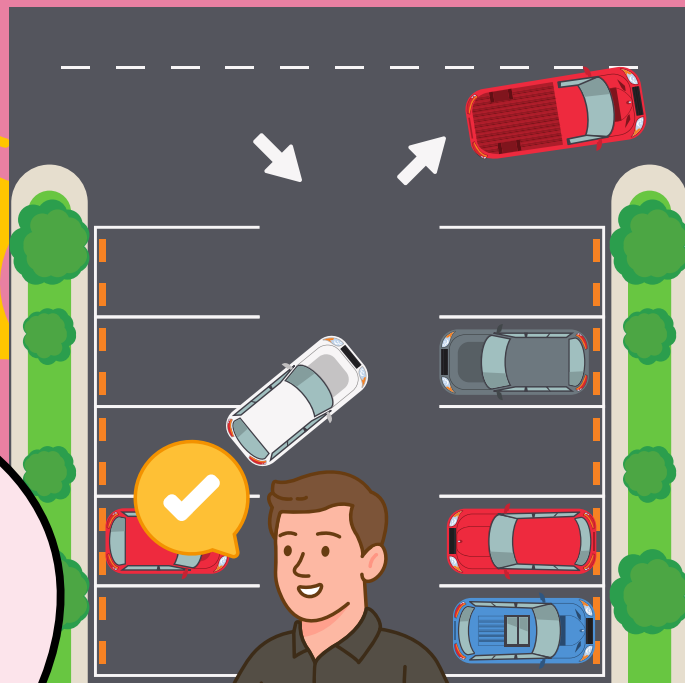
UNM-Gallup has announced that students and staff must obtain a Parking Permit before the Fall 2026 semester.
